



Program Income





Conservation of Urban Soil and Water Resources

Soil Erosion Sediment Control Program

The Soil Erosion Sediment Control (SESC) program is conducted through an interagency agreement with the US Army Corps of Engineers, IEPA, as well as municipal agreements with Aurora, Batavia, Elburn, Gilberts, North Aurora, and City of Chicago OMP. The program aims to control soil erosion and sedimentation in waters of the United States on construction sites that are under development and includes a review of plans and site inspections.

Stearns Road Bridge Corridor over the Fox River

Twenty years ago, former Congressman Dennis Hastert began working on an alternative route across the Fox River to alleviate traffic congestion in St. Charles. The project was completed and officially opened December 15, 2010. Nearly the entire construction site was located in high quality natural areas. For the last five years, KDSWCD staff reviewed construction plans and performed site inspections to ensure that the Fox River, adjacent tributaries, and natural resources were protected.




Land Use Opinion Reports

Enhancement and Protection of Natural Areas

Conservation Practices Program (CPP)

Funding is made available through the Illinois Department of Agriculture for conservation practices on cropland and urban areas. Projects can include sealing of abandoned wells, rain gardens and pond improvements.

In 2010, this program cost shared the sealing of one well for \$360. The KDSWCD also provided technical assistance and \$4,403 of cost share for the construction of three grassed waterways to address severe soil erosion on Follman Farms in Elgin. The three waterways constructed in the fall of 2010 will:

- Save approximately 29.5 tons of soil per year
- Reduce the amount nutrients entering the stream by 24 tons per year.

Conservation of Rural Soil and Water Resources

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)

NRCS provides leadership in a partnership effort to help private landowners and managers conserve, improve and sustain their soil, water and other natural resources.

2010 Accomplishments

- 3,225 acres of conservation farm plans applied to improve soil quality and/or improve water quality
- ◆ 18 farm parcel reviews completed to meet the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation Compliance
- 4 acres of wetland created, restored or enhanced
- ◆ 28 acres Grazing and Forest land with conservation applied to protect and improve the resource base
- 25 quarter sections in Kane County and DuPage County reviewed for the Natural Resources Inventory



Participate in Local Watershed Planning Activities

Fox River-Jelkes Creek Watershed Plan

In 2010, the KDSWCD was awarded an Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) 319 Grant to develop a watershed-based plan and non-point source education program for the Jelkes Creek Watershed and portions of the Fox River. The watershed is located mainly in the northern portion of Kane County but also includes small portions of McHenry, and Cook counties. The Fox River segment flows through the municipalities of Sleepy Hollow, West Dundee, East Dundee, Carpentersville, and a portion of Elgin. Funding for this project is provided in part through the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) under Section 319(h)of the Clean Water Act distributed through the IEPA.
